
# JAMES MACCABE C.I.T. AWARD

The year 1965 proved to be the greatest in the fifty-five year history of Camp Kern. The 1,046 campers enrolled represents more than just numbers. It represents many hours from each staff man who used his efforts and skills to look at each individual and hope that each boy would be a better individual for having been at Camp Kern.

The entire staff is grateful to Dr. Fred Maccabe who gave a week of his time to assist us in staff training. The training sessions were a great asset to the staff and gave us a better look at the problems of campers and new ways to solve their problems.

A Director is always pleased when the Camp is full to capacity and the staff has done the job. However, when a staff such as ours this past summer goes way beyond your expectations, you have something to shout about. The staff morale and enthusiasm was high the entire season and new program ideas came forth even the last week of Camp.

I am deeply grateful to Kent Barnheiser and Ted Hopple for outstanding performances in assisting me on the administration side of the ledger. Much of the credit for our success must go to these two.

Some of the new ideas that were inserted into the program proved to be most successful and were appreciated by the campers. The Sanctuary at the Bard Nature Lodge was a bee-hive of activity all summer. The canoe overnights were well received. The revival of the Camp newspaper, the Kernel, was a hit. Hopple's Rodeo with the live greased pig will long be remembered. The Indian show evening vespers, the clown act at the swim meet and the closing candlelight ceremony will always be an inspiration to all of us.

Some of the credit must also go to the kitchen and maintenance staffs under the capable leadership of Inez Gaylor and Bud Smith, because without their cooperation and teamwork the Camp could not operate.

We cannot rest on past records and as I write the finish of the '65 season, I look forward to the challenge of '66. The foundation has been laid and it's up to the staff to continue the building of boys into men.

## PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS




### INDIAN LORE

Durbin's performance at our Candlelight Ceremony at the close of each period will long be remembered by campers, staff and parents.


### CARE OF ANIMALS

The entire staff, under Ted Hopple's leadership, constructed a sanctuary next to the Bard Nature Building. This project took many extra man hours and certainly was above and beyond the call of duty by all involved. It gave an opportunity to many campers to learn first—hand about animals from our area and some from other countries. Boys were assigned to one animal to feed, water and care for.



### SAILING ELK LAKE

ELK Lake, which was constructed in the fall of 1964, was used this summer for canoeing, rowing, and some sailing. The Lake was used by all campers and certainly has been a most valuable addition to our facilities. Steve Patronsky, a junior at George Williams College, provided the leadership at the Lake and did an excellent job. His survival canoe trips were the highlight of the canoeing program.



#### RANCH CAMPING

This was an experimental program at Camp Kern and it proved to be most successful under the very fine leadership of Gary Wilkinson, ably assisted by junior counselors, Bob Rosati and Tom Warriner. Eight campers arrived on Sunday afternoon and were assigned a bunk and a horse.

#### TOTE THAT TACK

The boys soon learned to take care of their chores such as feeding, watering, brushing and shoveling. They also learned about the horse, care of tack, and most important they learned to become better riders.

The highlight of the program was a three-day trip to Kings Mills where the boys camped out, did their own cooking and spent a lot of time riding on the 1,000 acre King farm.



## TRANSPORTATION FOR PIONEERS

Our Pioneer Campers have been plagued for years with transportation problems. After four weeks of very frustrating experiences with station wagons and an old school bus the Camp Kern Board of Management purchased a new 1964 GMC, 60 passenger bus to be used exclusively for pioneer trips.

The Pioneer Program, under Mark Gueltig's excellent leadership, had the able assistance of Howie Gorrell, Pete Lehman, Tom Bowell, Rod Scott and junior counselor, Howie Webb.

This has been our best year in programming this age group and we hope to do as well or better in the future if we can maintain the type of leadership that we had in 1965.

## IMPROVEMENTS IN CAMP FACILITIES - 1965

The Staff Cabin, donated by the Dayton Civitan Club, was completed and used extensively by the staff. The fireplace in the cabin was built in memory of Jim Maccabe.

Aluminum dock installed at Elk Lake. Shelter also built at the lake by the Maintenance Staff.

Stack gas ovens were installed in the kitchen to add additional cooking space and were greatly appreciated by our kitchen staff.

Gas heaters were installed in the Lodge and this now gives us heat in the entire building.

Pete's Tower was sand blasted and painted through the generosity of Pete Doeller.

Six aluminum canoes were added to our fleet now giving us a total of 12.

Plywood paneling completed in the Pioneer Cabins and Recreation Building.

The Rifle Range was improved and expanded to handle 8 - 10 boys on the firing line at one time.

Farm fence was put up around the Nixon Property and also several areas were fenced for the horses.

## NEEDS FOR 1966

An additional piece of equipment for cutting grass.

We must overhaul our P.A. system and install some type of inter-com.

Some attention must be given to our swimming pool deck. We also have to install a new pool chlorinator.

Our main road into camp needs attention as well as the lane to the Nixon property.

A commercial type washer and dryer are needed to take care of laundry for the kitchen.

Our water system, including our emergency well, needs immediate attention and we must winterize parts of the water line so that we may go into a year round operation.
